Introduction and Ethos


Our setting is the only private purpose-built Nursery in West Cumbria . The main nursery was built in 2004 and the house was built in 2011. The link was built in 2016. They incorporate the higher safety features of a single storey building that enables ease of movement for our children to access outside spaces. The new Butterfly Room occupies a central position within the nursery and our children have safe access to the outside play spaces as well as the cover canopy.

The Nursery is managed by Mrs Julie Richardson B.Ed(Hons) whose last post was as Headteacher of an Independent Infant School with attached Nursery in Teesside. The management and organisation of Strawberry How Nursery attempts to offer a full educational experience for your child that is much more than simple "child care".



We are highly regarded by Cumbria Education Services and many of our practices are seen as models that should be used by other nurseries in our area. Our Nursery Staff are employed full time and all are highly qualified. Our childcare adult to child ratios are higher than those recommended by Ofsted. We were rated as "Outstanding" in our 2013 and 2019 inspections, the inspector described our setting as exceptional. We are committed to providing the very best education with the best childcare. This handbook is designed to help you support your child when they move to the Butterfly Room. Please take the time to read the handbook and then if you want please talk to us about any further questions you may have.

Because we want to be absolutely professional we ask parents to refrain from including our staff as friends on their Facebook page.



Our Aims

We have tried to provide a 'home from home' environment which provides care for every child that comes to the nursery. Physical contact, emotional support and practical challenges are part of all our lives, and our nursery provides the children with a way to enjoy their days spent at the nursery.

We provide an environment where young children have space and freedom, noise and peace, opportunities to enjoy themselves, fulfil ambitions, try out new ideas and share friendships within a framework of care and support.

We are really proud of our nursery environment and we hope this handbook gives you a good feel for it. Staff are dedicated to making your child's experience at nursery happy and fulfilling. Our nursery nurses are committed to providing a caring environment where high quality play and education are used to encourage your child's intellectual, physical, social and emotional development. We will:

- provide a happy and secure learning environment in which to learn and play
- encourage children to develop their independence and maturity
- promote physical, social, moral, creative and intellectual development
- establish a partnership between home and nursery.



Our Curriculum

We are proud of our curriculum. We aim to offer a curriculum which builds on things the children already know and can do. While it is based on Foundation Stage Curriculum which includes seven main areas of learning we have added greater variety that extend the requirements of the EYFS. We are specialists in this area and our children are exposed to a massive variety of experiences that are designed to extend learning.

The Prime Areas of Learning

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- A caring, polite attitude to others is fostered at all times helping to develop positive relationships.
- Children are made aware of behaviour that is acceptable to others and are helped to manage their own feelings.
- Good self-confidence and self-awareness is built and nurtured continually.
- Independence increases as a child moves through the nursery.

Physical Development

Children develop their physical confidence by using both the indoor and outdoor environments and by using large and small equipment.

- A child is encouraged to develop his/her manipulation skills by experiencing a wide range of materials.
- A positive attitude towards healthy eating and developing an active life is continually encouraged.



Communication and Language

- Children are helped to acquire appropriate skills
- and competence in speaking and listening. Children are helped to develop their understanding of language which is spoken to them.

The Specific Areas of Learning (an extension of the prime areas) Literacy

- Early skills in reading and writing are supported through play activities.
- Children are encouraged to develop their love of reading through singing nursery rhymes and listening to interesting stories.
- All these skills are successfully developed in other areas of learning.

Mathematics

- Children are helped to acquire practical mathematical understanding.
- Shape, space and measure are introduced through play.
- Children are encouraged to develop their understanding of positional and mathematical language.

Understanding of the World

- The child's own environment and experience is the key focus for developing understanding of their world
- Encourage children to talk about people in their community.
- Children are given opportunities to develop their curiosity and interest in making things happen.
- Children are given the opportunity to play and explore Technology

Expressive Arts and Design

Children have an opportunity to develop their own imagi-

nation through art, music, drama, stories and play.

• The children are encouraged to explore a variety of everyday materials and different media to develop this learning.



The Characteristics of Learning (learning through play)

Taking into account recent educational research we offer a Curriculum, which is based on children learning through planned and self-initiated purposeful play-based activities. This allows children to become confident learners;

a) by playing and exploring (being engaged),

b) by active investigating learning (being motivated) and c) by creating and thinking critically (becoming a thinker). Children learn at their own pace through valuable first hand experiences. We provide learning opportunities through:

- Sand—texture, sorting and matching
- Water—floating, sinking and volume Malleable Materials—observing, manipulating and changing substances
- Painting—fine and gross motor control, colour mixing and experimentation
- Music—listening and exploring
- Construction—building, selecting and arranging
- Small-World—imagination and sharing
- Role-Play—imagination, creativity, speaking and listening
- Mark-Making—fine motor control, co-ordination and communication
- Story—sequencing, narrating, left to right orientation
- Outdoors—co-ordination, communication, exploring and movement



ICT— hand-eye coordination, mouse control, investigation

These areas are available throughout the day in the

Educational Visits

We believe that it is very important for children to have the opportunity to experience 'real things'. This is a notion that is central to our nursery. We are blessed with a great location so we try our best to use it. To this end the staff arrange a variety of trips for the children and these visits are designed and risk assessed specifically for the age of the children concerned.

- When they are very young the first trip involves a visit to the local park and post box.
- As they grow older the children walk to the local supermarket and shops.
- Later in the Squirrels the children visit the local opticians, dentist and health centre with trips further afield involving a journey in a minibus to a local farm. Our oldest children take a coach trip even further to Mawbray beach, Crummock, The Lake District Wild Life Park, Whinlatter and the Aquarium. You can see these locations on the website.

Our local **Postman** showed the boys and girls inside his post van to see all the parcels and letters he has to deliver around town.






Zoolab The children were able to see and touch some wonderful exotic creatures from the Rain Forest. There were snakes, lizards, beetles and frogs to mention but a few.



Curriculum Planning for the Butterfly Room

Curriculum planning is a continual process and we strive to improve the experiences that we offer the children by incorporating structured themes together with the children's own interests. The broad outline areas are indicated below and this planning will also take into account topical changes throughout the year.



The planning can be found after login on the nursery website. Our short term planning is updated fortnightly and parents are welcome to read about the activities designed for the children. Our 6 week planning cycles are on the website and posted in the porch. There is a Parents' Meetings held once a year for <u>all</u> the children to discuss their progress and a special 2 Year report and meeting around a child's second birthday.




Inside and Outdoor Play


We have created a secure outdoor play area with creative and stimulating play equipment. This development has been carefully designed to promote and develop both positive free and structured play in the fresh air. This area includes an aviary, play house, shop, den, a castle with a tunnel system underneath, a sandpit, raised beds, a green house and a large canopy. Our children grow peas, strawberries, raspberries and tomatoes. We also have a variety of "smelley" herbs including rosemary and mint.























Preparing your Child for the Butterflies

We want your child to 'feel at home' in our Butterfly Room and to enjoy the caring and exciting learning environment. Some children are very confident when starting in the Butterfly Room while others may take a little longer to settle. Before moving to the Butterfly Room your child will have taster sessions where he/she will get to know the staff, new surroundings and meet new friends. Your child's new Room Leader will arrange an telephone appointment with you 1-2 weeks before the move date to discuss your child's transition. At this time you will be asked to complete a transition questionnaire giving as much detail as possible to make the transition easier.

Main Changes between the Caterpillars and Butterflies

We provide healthy morning and afternoon snacks each day. We follow a seasonal snack menu and this is posted on our website under Nursery Meals and in the entrance porch. A hot lunch from Lorton School costs £3.00. At 3.45pm we have a Tea Time. We provide tea.

- We don't really want to store bags—we would rather use our storage space for toys.
- You do not need to send a bag with foodstuffs— we provide breakfast, morning snack, lunch comes from Lorton School, afternoon snack and tea.
- You do not need to send drinks. We provide Milk and Water throughout the day. Please do not provide individual cups.
- Please label all of your child's clothes to help us return them to you.
- Rather than bringing nappies everyday please provide 15 at a time. We will pass a note to you when we need more. We have a collection of spare clothes and you only need
- to provide spare clothes during toilet training.
- After lunch your child can take a nap, we provide sleep mats, blankets and cushions. Should your child feel sleepy there will always be an opportunity to take a nap during the day.

Changing nappies takes place at scheduled times (also throughout the day when needed). Activities are designed to promote interest, curiosity, exploration and the spirit of adventure. We encourage children to be independent learners happy to discover the world around them by providing safe and secure environments.

At our nursery we know that you understand your child very well and are 'in tune' with their development and changes. We therefore ask to be informed if there are any changes in your child's routines as soon as possible to allow staff to adjust routines in the nursery to match your child's continual development.

While the children are in our nursery they are given the



opportunity to experience a diverse array of activities to expand their experiences and develop their knowledge of the world around them. They also have a chance to play constructively with their friends and develop the social skills needed throughout their life.



Taster Session

If your child is moving from the Caterpillar Room we will contact you to arrange a telephone transition meeting to talk about the changes and we will organise taster sessions in-house. If your child is new we will contact you to arrange a taster session(s). During the telephone meeting or at the time of the first taster parents will be given a questionnaire and asked to provide the nursery staff with as much information about their child as possible to help their child settle into the Butterfly Room. Detailed information about their child's routines and eating habits provide the staff with very useful information to assist them in following routines at home. Other information includes;

Allergies

Rests after eating

Special likes and dislikes
Special medication

The staff make a record of all that was eaten throughout the day and this information is passed on to parents at the end of the day. Please note that while our nursery aspires to be "nut free" we cannot guarantee this because some purchased food products are prepared in environments that use nuts.

Sleep Routines

Our younger Butterflies may still require a sleep during the day and this generally occurs after lunch. The children go to sleep on special mats in the Sleep Room and a member of staff is on hand to see that everything is fine. As a child wakes up the time is recorded on the sleep chart. This information is passed on to parents when they come to collect their child.

Administration of Medication

On the Nursery registration form we ask parents to give us permission to administer medication, i.e. Calpol or Sudocrem for slight skin irritation. The staff will only administer prescribed medicine after parents have signed a special 'Administration of Medicine' form to ensure that all instructions have been given to the Nursery Nurses. The nursery asked to be informed if your child's medical situation changes after completing our initial registration form.

Ratios for Staff and Children

At all times we ensure that our staff/child ratios are above the Ofsted guidelines. To maintain this level of care we ask parents to inform us of any changes to their child's registered attendance before the 15th of each month for the following month in order that we can allocate staff their hours and provide the children with quality care at the highest level at all times. The Nursery is unable to swap days within a month once these hours have been booked.

Key Person

While each Nursery Nurse must know the individual needs of all children, each child is given a 'Key Person' who is there to take special responsibility for their care, learning and wellbeing. The Key Person also compiles a special progress record

for parents to track their child's progress whilst in Nursery. Parents are welcome to view their individual record on Tapestry (our online assessment app) and are also encouraged to add contributions to their child's record using their login to upload videos, pictures and text.

Tapestry

Our Butterfly Room staff will use the online Tapestry -Learning Journal to gather together daily information about our children. Essentially this enhances the feedback



offered through our Facebook page.

Collection of Children and Password

The Nursery staff will only hand over a child to a known adult. If a member of staff does not know the person they will ask them to wait at the door until they have got confirmation that they have the authority to collect the child. In the case of an emergency and a parent is unable to collect their child, and they send an unknown person in their place, that person **must** know the special password, given to us by the parents during the registration process.

Website and Login

We have a comprehensive website which is designed to give parents detailed information about our nursery. It also keeps parents up to date with nursery developments. Each family is given a parental login to give them access to our 'secure pages' that are not viewed by the general public. We post the following weeks lunch menu (from Lorton School) each Friday on the website. You will also find the seasonal snack menu (there are 8 throughout the year) along with lists of snack menu and lunch menu allergens. The six weekly thematic plans are also placed in the secure section.

Facebook

We regularly post comments and photographs relating to activities that we've previously outlined in the thematic planning. This has proved to be a great success with grandparents around the world getting access. Our facebook page is a "secret" page which is the highest security setting.

Newsletters

We add a newsletter to our website each month. This newsletter gives parents information about activities which have taken place at nursery together with forthcoming events. There are lots of photographs of the play and learning activities. Permission slips for the Photographer or for visits and trips are also included in the newsletter.



In the summer term we often hold a Garden Party for all the children at Strawberry How Nursery. Parents are invited to join in the fun with their children. There is a 'Treasure Hunt', a Bouncy Castle and the children are able to have their faces painted. Mums, Dads, Grandparents and friends can also relax in our Café with refreshments and cakes.



The Library and Storytellers

We have links with the library and a story teller visits us in the year. We

constantly update and replenish our picture and story books in the Butterfly Room.





Ted Bear and Charlie's Adventures



In the Butterfly Room the children have a number of special teddy bears. When a child goes on holiday, has a special event at the weekend or simply wants a friend to come over and play they can take Ted Bear or Charlie home with them. Mums and Dads record all the adventures by taking photo-

graphs to show where Ted or Charlie has been and they put them in their special book. If you would like to take one of the bears home with you please ask a Nursery Nurse to arrange a visit.



All Year Wrap Around Quality Education and Care

Strawberry How Nursery School is open from 7.30am - 6.00pm Monday to Friday 51 weeks of the year.

We are closed on Bank Holidays and for a week between Christmas and the New Year.



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
